AGENDA	O There are over 1,000 B&C Home beds in Austin with around 90 beds currently open ■ D Shubitz contacted UT School of Social Work about their B&C Home survey ■ UT School of Social Work interested in working with the committee going forward ■ D Shubitz has phone call planned to discuss next steps ■ UT School of Social Work provided committee with a copy of their survey and gave permission for the committee to implement it ■ D Shubitz contacted Austin Tenants Council (ATC) about their records around B&C Homes ■ ATC stated they rarely receive call from tenants at B&C Homes ■ Most of the calls they do receive need to be referred to Adult Protective Services (APS) and don't fall under the purview of tenant's rights ■ City HHS presentation on Board and Care standards ■ The State introduced B&C standards in 2009 but these standards were unfunded and not required ■ The City of Austin took some steps to adopt the standards in 2012 but efforts were not successful ■ Currently examining ways to update 2012 standards ■ Link to historical material from 2012 HHSD presentation ■ Link to Community Engagement Findings (p 34) ■ In Fall 2018 the City Council passed a resolution to "explore opportunities and options to improve the standard of care offered by [Board and Care Home] providers" ■ In response, Austin Public Health issued a memo outlining 2 potential avenues to improve standards ■ Licensing B&C Home providers ■ Licensing B&C Home providers ■ Incentive program for B&C Home providers ■ Incentive program for B&C Home providers ■ APH is currently seeking public input with responses due by the end of June ■ Committee feedback on APH proposals □ Incentive ideas ■ Trainings for B&C staff on CPR/First Aid, mental health, small business classes, and healthy meal preparation ■ Discounts on utilities or facility repairs	Committee members to review UT survey
